Why a Micro-MOOC? According to Dave Cormier, a MOOC:

- "...integrates the connectivity of social networking, the facilitation of an acknowledged expert in a field of study, and a collection of freely accessible online resources. Perhaps most importantly, however, a MOOC builds on the active engagement of several hundred to several thousand "students" who self-organize their participation according to learning goals, prior knowledge and skills, and common interests." -- The [MOOC Model for Digital Practice](#) by Alexander McAuley, Bonnie Stewart, George Siemens and Dave Cormier.
